## 2012-13 School Year in Review

The ASEAC Team has been working hard to strengthen the scholarship program, and continues to do so. Here are some of the highlights from the past year:

# **Eco-Club Update (March – May)**

Eco-Club is ASEAC's after-school program that provides students with additional learning activities in subjects not frequently taught in high school, including environmental education, leadership skills, and cultural awareness. The hands-on design of our activities promotes socialization among students and the formation of new friendships. Students are divided into three groups according to age and year of entry into the program. Each group meets once every three weeks. ## March: Art made from recycled paper

Veteran students taught newbies how to make recycled paper for greeting cards. Students then decorated the cards with an assortment of dried leaves and flowers collected from the local environment. Paige also taught all groups how to make notebooks and wallets out of recycled materials.

## April: Art made from recycled tires

Paige collected old tire tubes from local "vulcanizadoras" (tire shops) that would normally have been burned. Students washed, cut, and sewed pieces of tire tubes to create coin purses and pencil cases.

#### May: Children's Rights and Sexual Education

Paige and a fellow Peace Corps volunteer started a three month-long course on children's rights and sexual education. Topics covered include: children's rights, human sexuality, STDs, teen pregnancy, contraception, and family planning, among others.

### Why Donate?

Sometimes people ask us why students need scholarships to attend public high school. The answer is: to pay for the purchase of mandatory uniforms and materials and to help offset the cost of transportation to and from school. The high cost of public education and low household income in Cotacachi means that families spend disproportionate amounts of their total earnings (13%) on education, making it their third highest expense at over \$50 a month. While nowadays education has become a priority and parents are making huge efforts to send their children to school, fewer than half of the total population in Cotacachi's communities has completed elementary school, and less than 10% has a high school education. Our annual scholarships of \$200 are designed to help offset the cost of education thereby increasing the likelihood that these bright young students will be able to finish high school and have more opportunities in life.

#### Why Volunteer?

Our Eco-Club meets every Wednesday afternoon, from 2:30 to 4:00pm behind UNORCAC (González Suárez N° 2083 y Quiroga in Cotacachi). By volunteering your time at Eco-Club you will get the chance to connect with students through teaching and learning. In Cotacachi we are very lucky to have many talented individuals within our community, some of whom have given workshops to our students in art, music and textiles, just to name a few!
